NATIONAL DAY OF ACTION AGAINST BULLYING AND VIOLENCE - FRIDAY 18 MARCH

"Do things for people not because of who they are or what they do in return, but because of who vou are." - Harold S. Kushner

Bullying is an ongoing and deliberate misuse of power in relationships through repeated verbal, physical and/or social behaviour that intends to cause physical, social and/or psychological harm. It can involve an individual or a group misusing their power, or perceived power, over one or more persons who feel unable to stop it from happening.

The theme for this year's National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence is 'Kindness Culture'.

The Kindness Culture theme offers an opportunity for us to learn more about kindness and how to demonstrate kind behaviour. Kindness plays an important role in bullying prevention and is linked to our school values of CARE (Connect, Aspire, Respect and Empower) Students and classes have been learning about what bullying is and what to do if you see bullying, or are being bullied yourself. SRC members gave each class new 'bully report' forms to make it even easier to report a bully if you see one. Our updated Bullying policy is on our website. Please make sure you look at how we help reduce bullying here at Willunga Primary.

During Week 7, Students and staff will participate in 'Random acts of Kindness'. Students will also be involved in a rock painting scavenger hunt to spread kindness to everyone.



SAYING NO

In a healthy relationship of any kind there will be times when one person says no. Their boundary is not a betrayal. You don't need to apologise for it. You may both feel uncomfortable but that is ok. That is what healthy feels like sometimes.

If you set a boundary and someone else is disappointed or upset by that reaction it does not mean that you are not allowed to set boundaries or that it is wrong to do that.

If you ask someone for something and they say no, that does not mean you shouldn't ask for things or it is wrong to ask.

There will be times with your child when you say no to what your child wants or does. There will be times when that feels bad to the other person. That can be uncomfortable but it is healthy and good to be able to say no. It is healthy for your child to be able to hear no and accept it even when it is disappointing.

It is healthy and good to own your emotional reaction and understand that being upset is normal and a manageable feeling and not a crisis that requires you to give up your boundaries.

That said, saying no too often can be exhausting for you and your child. Experts advise a healthy balance to deny, deter and discipline.

ORCHID CLUB

JAPANESE

Learning a language is a really slow process. For your child, this means that grammar has to be repeated many times and in different ways. When we do a theme, grammar is presented through a different lens, but many sentence structures will be similar. The vocabulary, kanji, culture and etiquette may change with different topics. Also, as children progress, there is greater difficulty in their tasks.

R-2

Students will be looking at culture and festivals in Japan. They will be reading and writing very simple modelled sentences with a lot of support. We will use books, flashcards, online stories etc to begin to learn Hiragana or simple grammar points. Songs and short skits are very helpful to learn grammar and vocabulary in a fun way.

Yr 3/4

Students will follow shopping topic to create language around money, questions, talking about what they will eat, see, drink and so on. They will respond to simple questions using short sentences, and translate simple texts. Students are becoming much more confident to use the Japanese language. They are still learning Hiragana, but at this stage should be reading most of them without support.

Yr 4/5

Students will use the broad topic of "going to" to create language around places, activities, invitations and responses-talking about what they will eat, see, drink and so on. They will be able to respond to simple questions using short sentences, and translate simple texts. They will be maintaining Hiragana, and using relative katakana.

Yr 6

Students will be learning to talk about their school life, activities, time, people, location and doing this with little help from the teacher. They will be using Kanji and katakana related to this topic.

For those who are new to the school, I am the school Pastoral Care Worker as well as working as an SSO. I have a Cert IV in

Youth Work, which is a requirement of my role and am also a qualified Disaster and Recovery Chaplin. Our role is described as 'An Ambulance on the way to Hospital'. Mostly students can be helped at our site but at other times, we need to refer to other agencies.

My role at the school involves a number of things within the school as well as outside of the school with local churches and community groups. Through this link, I have been able to gain financial support for some families as well as organising meals for those who are struggling for a variety of reasons. Last Week Rod Marsh the Australian Cricketer passed away. With the unfortunate untimely death of the amazing cricketer Shane Warn however, Rod Marsh's death will probably not be quite as well publicised. For me however, Rod Marsh was a big part of my growing up. I had 22 pictures of him in my room, my older brothers and I went to lots of matches and I did grow up in the era where you were allowed to run onto the oval at the end of a match. I really wanted his autograph and although I ran on the oval, I didn't get his autograph, I went to Marion Shopping Centre when the Australian cricketers visited there and still didn't get his autograph. I was determined to get it so decided to give something else a go. Knowing he was from Western Australia I decided to send a letter. So, I send a cringeworthy letter with a card and made up poem that I wanted him to sign and addressed it to:

Rod Marsh Australian Cricketer Western Australian

A number of weeks later I couldn't believe when I not only had my card returned with his autograph, but a picture of him as well with my name and his autograph on that too! Now I had his autograph twice! I had been so disappointed each time I missed out on an autograph opportunity previously but now what I had was so much more special than if I had got his autograph years ago.



I have been in the Reception class when they have been working on their Growth Mindset activities. Looking at... What They Can Do and What They Can't Do...YET! The Power of YET! To keep trying, giving of their best, not giving up. I may not have received a letter back when I sent it to Rod Marsh all those years ago (and lots of people warned me not to get my hopes up) but I had to try. And that's all what we really encourage students to do, try and give of their best in all areas. Who knows what they can achieve. Maybe something far more amazing than gaining a cricketer's autograph!

MUSIC

We are excited to be undertaking Music again in 2022 at Willunga Primary School. Each class will be exploring the following areas:

Reception

- exploring sounds using voice and instruments
- practicing play and moving to a beat
- exploring syllables in animal names
- developing listening skills for identifying high and low, fast and slow
- practice singing song and chants
- · matching music with emotions

Year 1

- Echoing rhythmic patterns
- Practicing using syllables to create rhythms
- Reading picture scores
- Identify and using the four different voices – loud, whisper, singing, speaking
- Breathing exercises based on five animals' – lion, bee, cat, owl and crocodile
- · Matching music with emotions

Year 1/2, 2

- Reviewing 1 and 2 sounds on a beat
- Reading and composing using picture scores
- Practice singing using a signing voice
- Breathing exercises based on five animals – lion, bee, cat, owl and crocodile
- Matching music with emotions

Year 2/3 and 3/4

- Singing in rounds
- Practice using longer rhythmic patterns using 1 and 2 sounds on a beat
- Sing solo in singing games
- Play classroom percussion instruments correctly in time
- Breathing exercises shape breathing
- Matching music to the Zaones of Regulation

Year 4/5

- Passing an object on the beat as a group
- Creating and following a 4-beat rhythmic pattern with others
- Reading, playing and composing with rhythmic patterns containing 1, 2 and no sound on a beat
- Aurally identifying 4 and 8 beat rhythmic patterns
- Matching music to the Zones of Regulation

Year 6

- Passing an object on the beat as a group
- Composing with others for an emotion
- Investigating the role of music in film and the role of the film composter
- Creating a film trailer
- Aurally identifying 4 and 8 beat rhythmic patterns
- Matching music to the Zones of Regulation




