HOOK INTO BOOKS FOR BOOK WEEK!

Did you realise that a child's brain is not 'hardwired' for reading? Research undertaken by neuroscientists has revealed that reading is possibly the most challenging task we expect the 'young brain' to undertake. Reading must be 'taught' it cannot be 'caught'.

So, why is Reading, listening, and telling stories to children of any age so powerful?

Why?

- It supports positive self-esteem and prosocial behaviour.
 It builds confidence and resilience, nurtures empathy, creativity and allows for relaxation and escape.
- It is an important mental health protective factor in the adolescent years.
- It supports academic achievement across the school

years – school attachment and retention, one of the most protective factors for children, now and for their futures.

At Life Without Barriers, we are committed to providing learning opportunities to children and young people in out-of-home (OOHC) who experience additional barriers to educational engagement as opposed to their peers.

Do you enjoy reading? Telling and sharing stories?

Kids love to copy adults, and if they see you cuddled up with a good book, telling stories around the dinner table at night or taking time to read the newspaper over a coffee on a Sunday, they may want to join in!

We want our children and young people to enjoy and be motivated to connect to stories.

We can all do simple everyday things to encourage children to read. Creating excitement around literacy can start by reading to them and with them, or by a fun activity like a trip to the library where they can select their own books.

There are so many ways to connect to stories, and from August – October, Life Without Barriers is getting Hooked into Books!


