MAKERS EMPIRE KIDS IN SPACE NATIONAL PROJECT - STAFF TRAINING

On the 23rd and 24th of February, we attended the Maker's Empire professional development days on behalf of Willunga Primary. Only 8 schools were accepted out of 400 in SA, and were lucky enough to be selected! As part of this program, our school will also be receiving a 3D printer.


The first day was held at the Australian Space Discovery Centre in the city and the second day took place at the Space School at Hamilton Secondary College.

Maker's Empire partners with the Australian Space Discovery Centre and the Andy Thomas Space Foundation. Their vision is for 'every child to become a creator, innovator and problem solver so they can make their world better'. They aim to develop children's design thinking skills using their 3D design software.

We learnt about the emerging space industry and the exciting opportunities available to Australians. This will help us to inspire our young people about the ever-growing opportunities for their future jobs, now available to them here in Australia.

We learnt how to operate a 3D printer, discussed how the Maker's Empire software connects to the Curriculum, and how we will be implementing it throughout the year. Students will participate in a 3D-printing design project to solve a hypothetical problem in space. At the end of Term 2, a group of students will have the opportunity to present their finished projects at a showcase at the Australian Space Discovery Centre with other schools. We left the training feeling enthused to start the program and excited for the opportunities available to our students at Willunga Primary.
