Our school is a special place with strong community connections and provides an educational journey for students from Reception to Year 6 to thrive. Reading Fluency

Reading is a complex process that involves learning to decode texts and learning to make meaning from texts. We can think about reading fluency as the 'bridge' between decoding text and understanding text. When children read text fluently, they can begin to better understand what they are reading. If reading is hesitant and disjointed, meaning is lost.

What is Reading Fluency?

Reading fluency is not just about reading quickly. It is the ability to read with appropriate pace, phrasing and expression. Reading with phrasing requires children to pay attention to the full stops, question marks and exclamation points to make their reading sound like spoken text. Children can use expression by using character voices and adjusting the pace of their reading.

How you can help your child develop fluency

Children need to hear what fluent reading sounds like. Regularly read interesting books out loud to your child. Vary your pace and use phrasing and expression!

To develop fluency, your child will need to practice reading a text that is simple for them. Library Readers are carefully selected at school to match your child's decoding ability so that they can practice reading fluently at home. Some people might think their child's reader is 'too easy' – this is deliberate! Don't worry, your child will be reading more difficult texts at school to practice their decoding skills.

Repeated reading is a great way to develop fluency: have your child read the same passage, page or reader over and over until they are more fluent. They could read to a younger sibling or a grandparent!

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Japanese

This semester, students are learning concepts of Japanese nature and its deep links with culture. We will explore the connections between seasons and celebrations, which includes learning about Japanese festivals and seasonal food. Students will learn that activities are influenced by cultural perceptions of seasons and weather.

Learning is contextualised within students' understanding of blossom culture within the Willunga community. Students are supported to compare their own knowledge of blossom with that of the Japanese notions of cherry blossom to understand the connection between nature and culture that exists across cultures.

Students will understand that culture and geography influence the recognition of seasons within a culture. They will do this by exploring and comparing Kaurna and Japanese seasons with seasons recognised in their own cultures.

Science

In Term 3, students in Reception to Year 6 will focus on Earth and Space Sciences. They will continue to develop their skills in questioning, predicting, investigating, reflecting, analysing and sharing their ideas. There has already been a high level of engagement from all classes in this new topic, and we look forward to sharing more with you as the term progresses.

Reception students will learn: how daily and seasonal changes in our environment affect everyday life.

Year 1 students will learn: about the observable changes that occur in the sky and landscape.

Year 2 students will learn: the variety of ways Earth's resources are used.

Year 3 students will learn: how Earth's rotation on its axis causes regular changes, including day and night.

Year 4 students will learn: ways Earth's surface changes over time as a result of natural processes & human activity.

Year 5 students will learn: about the Earth and planets

Year 6 students will learn: about sudden geological changes and extreme weather events, and how they can affect the Earth's surface.

This term in Music, the students will undertake an exciting program:

Receptions and Year 1

- Practise singing songs and chants
- Identify instruments, dynamics and a steady beat in music they listen to
- Practise singing and signing the solfege notes 'do, re, me, so and la'
- Play rhythms of known songs on instruments
- Create short dance sequences using locomotor and non-locomotor movements

Year 2

- Sing songs in Call and Response form
- Identify instruments, dynamics, and expression (staccato and legato) in music they listen to
- Improvise on xylophones using the La pentatonic scale
- · Aurally identify and notate rhythms using Ta and Titi
- Perform rehearsed scripts for peers

Year 3

- Identify instruments of the Orchestra visually and aurally
- Describe the instrument families and how they produce sound
- Play simple melodies on xylophone
- Play their own part against two other parts on xylophone
- Improvise dialogue in drama
- Draw a creative creature using a range of textures

Year 4

- Aurally identify music in 3/4 and 4/4 time signatures
- Practise conducting patterns in 3/4 and 4/4 time signatures
- Identify instruments in Indonesian Gamelan ensemble
- Describe the Indonesian cultural practises for the Gamelan Ensemble
- Choreograph a dance in a small group using the elements of nature
- Perform their dance for peers

Year 4/5

- Aurally identify music in 3/4 and 4/4 time signatures
- Practise conducting patterns in 3/4 and 4/4 time signatures
- Create and perform film scores with background sounds, characters themes and actions sounds
- Create a bucket drum arrangement

Year 5/6 and 6

- Aurally identify music in 3/4 and 4/4 time signatures
- Describe and notate rhythm features in music using traditional terminology (minim, crotchet, quaver, semiquavers)
- Record musical ideas such as a bass riff using digital technology
- Choreograph and perform a dance sequence including sport equipment

PE & SCHOOL SPORT

In PE, Reception and Year 1 students will practise fundamental movement skills in minor game and play situations. This involves applying different locomotor skills to move from one point to another.

Students also focus on sending, controlling and receiving objects at different levels and in different ways. We engage in running games like Cops and Robbers, Sharks and Islands and Stuck in the Mud.

The Year 2 & 3 students are supported in increasing the range and complexity of their fundamental movement skills. They refine and extend skills learnt in Foundation to include locomotor skills such as rolling, leaping, skipping, galloping and dodging, and object control skills such as striking and kicking objects from the ground or moving towards them. They engage in games like Poison Ball, Dodgeball and practice their catching and throwing skill with a variety of different balls and equipment.

The Year 4 to Year 6 students refine and modify movement skills and apply movement concepts across a range of situations. They apply stability and locomotor skills to dodge and feint in different movement situations. Students adapt kicking, striking and throwing skills to a variety of new games and activities. They participate positively in groups and teams by contributing to group activities, encouraging others and negotiating roles and responsibilities. This term they focus on their basketball, volleyball and athletics skills.

SAPSASA Football

Willunga Primary School's SAPSASA Football team enjoyed further success in their recent round 2 match at Willunga. The win puts them through to Round 3 where they will play on Friday 18th August. Good luck boys!

Hi our names are Tyler and Tommy and we are captains of the Willunga Primary football team.
