
We are working on placements of contract staff so we are hopeful to announce that some of our fabulous contract staff will be continuing on with us again in 2024.

Red Cross Pillowcase Program

Students in Years 3 and 4 participated in a disaster resilience education program run by Australian Red Cross, called the Pillowcase Program.

Designed to help children prepare for, cope with and respond to an emergency, the workshop included a discussion about the importance of being prepared, as well as interactive activities to help students prepare their minds for an emergency and consider what to pack in an emergency kit. Each student was given a pillowcase to decorate and take home, to start their own personal emergency kit.

Whether your child participated in the program or not, Red Cross would encourage all of us to get prepared for the emergencies that life throws at us. They have also stressed how important it is to not only make an emergency plan but to discuss and practise that plan with children.



Getting Your Household Prepared

Red Cross have provided a checklist of actions to prepare our households and children for emergencies. I encourage you, if you haven't already, to complete these as a household.

All the children in our house know what an emergency is (a serious, dangerous and scary situation where help might be needed)

- All children in our house know how to stay calm by 'breathing with colour' (slowly breathing in their favourite colour and then slowly exhaling their least favourite colour to regulate breathing)
- All the children in our house know how and when to call for help (visit <u>kids.triplezero.gov.au</u>)
- ✓ We have a safe meeting place outside our house and have practised how to get there
- ✓ We know who to call if we can't find each other
- ✓ We have an emergency kit packed ready to go if we have to leave our house quickly

Music Term 4 Overview

This term in Music students will:

Receptions and Year 1

- Practise singing songs and chants
- Practise singing and signing the solfege notes 'do, re, me, fa, so, la, ti, do'
- Practise reading and clapping rhythms with Ta, Titi and Za
- Aurally identify form of songs they listen to

Year 2

- Identify instruments, dynamics, and expression (staccato and legato) in music they listen to
- Practise singing and signing the solfege notes 'do, re, me, so and la, ti and high do'
- Aurally identify simple melodies with hand signs
- Revise the elements of music

Year 3

- Play simple melodies on xylophone
- Play their own part against 2 other parts on xylophone
- Aurally identify and notate rhythms using Ta, Titi and Za
- Name notes in the Treble Clef

Year 4

- Play chords on xylophone and ukulele
- Create an arrangement for small xylophone and ukulele ensemble
- Aurally identify major and minor chords
- Aurally identify and notate rhythms using Ta, Titi and Tiki Tika

Year 4/5

- Aurally identify music in 3/4 and 4/4 time signatures
- Practise conducting patterns in 3/4 and 4/4 time signatures
- Aurally identify major and minor chords
- Aurally identify and notate rhythms using Ta, Titi and Tiki Tika

Year 5/6 and 6

- Read, play and perform bass riffs on xylophone
- Aurally identify and notate rhythms using crotchets, quavers, semiquavers and rests.
- Play a range of instruments in a class band
- Prepare and sing a song for the Year 6 graduation

Choir

Students in Year 3 and 4 are able join choir this term in preparation for the Twilight Concert. They are learning two Christmas songs.

Science Term 4 Overview

This term students in Reception to Year 6 are focusing on Physical Sciences.

We are in the transition phase to Version 9 of the Australian Curriculum, and students have been thoroughly engaged in this topic so far. We look forward to sharing more with you about our learning on Seesaw throughout the term.

Please reach out if you would like to know more about what your child is learning in our specialist Science lessons.

Students in Reception to Year 2 will focus on the way objects move, push and pull, light and sound.

Reception students will develop their skills in participating in guided investigations and making observations.

Year 1 students will develop their skills in making predictions and representing and communicating their observations in a variety of ways.

Year 2 students will develop their skills in representing and communicating their observations and comparing them with others.

Year 3 students will focus on the ways heat is produced, and the transfer of heat from one object to another. They will develop their skills in planning and conducting scientific investigations considering the safe use of equipment and materials and reflecting on investigations, including whether a test was fair or not.

Year 4 students will focus on contact and noncontact forces. They will develop their skills in predicting, comparing results with predictions, planning and conducting scientific investigations considering the safe use of equipment and materials and reflecting on investigations.

Year 5 and 6 students will focus on light sources and energy. They will develop their skills in identifying, planning and applying the elements of scientific investigations to answer questions and solve problems using equipment and materials safely, identifying potential risks

PE Term 4 Overview

In Physical Education lessons, the Reception and Year 1 students will continue to practise fundamental movement skills in minor game and play situations. This involves applying different locomotor skills to move from one point to another.

Students also focus on sending, controlling and receiving objects at different levels and in different ways. Students engage in running games like Taggers and Savers, teamwork games like Parachute activities and ball games like Kickball.

The Year 2 and 3 students are supported in increasing the range and complexity of their fundamental movement skills. They refine and extend skills learnt in Foundation to include locomotor skills such as rolling, leaping, skipping, galloping and dodging, and object control skills such as striking and kicking objects from the ground or moving towards them.

Students engage in games like Frisbee Golf, Kickball, Cricket and practice their catching and throwing skill with a variety of different balls and equipment.

The Year 4 to Year 6 students refine and modify movement skills and apply movement concepts across a range of situations. They apply stability and locomotor skills to dodge and feint in different movement situations. Students adapt kicking, striking and throwing skills to a variety of new games and activities.

They participate positively in groups and teams by contributing to group activities, encouraging others and negotiating roles and responsibilities. This term they focus on their Sports day, Cricket and Tennis skills.

Japanese Term 4 Overview

Year R-2 will continue their unit on identity this term, which will involve learning how to name and write colours in Japanese, as well as express their opinions about colours.

This will lead into several weeks of Christmas activities, where students will have opportunity to further develop their intercultural knowledge of festivals and celebrations across cultures.

Year 3's will learn about concepts of Japanese gardens, language to describe elements of Japanese gardens and ultimately design their own Japanese garden using natural resources. This unit is designed to complement students' learning in design and gardening club this term.

Year 4-6 will continue building their intercultural knowledge by learning about how seasons and culture impact celebrations.

Students will create a 2024 bilingual calendar that explains celebrations in Japanese, and shows knowledge and understanding of Japanese festival culture.
